Midnight Sun Spurtle Challenge

The Midnight Sun Spurtle Oatmeal Competition was such a fun addition the Alaska Scottish Highland Games in 2023 that this competition will be an annual event. The event will be held Saturday, June 29, 2024, the time to be determined.

You are still wondering, "What is a spurtle?" This is a tool that is used in Scotland to make the perfect oatmeal. The long, rounded end of the spurtle allows the oatmeal to cook evenly and without lumps or burning. Properly used, this tool still proves to result in delicious oatmeal.

Steel cut oats are used in this competition, which consists of 2 rounds. The first round is to make a traditional pot of porridge using oats, salt, and water. Your oatmeal is judged on flavor, texture, and appearance. Points are also given for cleanliness of cooking area and overall hygiene while cooking. The second round gives you the creativity to create a pot of porridge that can be either savory or sweet. Your imagination is the only limit! Judging criteria for this round include creativity, flavor, texture, and presentation. Again, points are also awarded for cleanliness of cooking area during your preparation, and overall hygiene.



Judges from local area, great prizes and overall a highlight of the Scottish Highland games. A secret...Come dressed in your highlander clothes and it's amazing how delicious and authentic your oatmeal will taste. We will have two age groups, 12-17 and over 18. Teams can be made up of 2 people. All basic ingredients and cooking equipment are supplied. You will even go home with a spurtle just for participating. Sign up and start practicing your steel cut oatmeal making skills and we look forward to seeing you at the competition.

THE HISTORY OF AMERICAN WHISKEY

The Early Years of American Whiskey

George Washington knew all about distilling liquor. He erected stills at Mount Vernon in the 1770s, and with the help of James Anderson, his Scottish plantation manager, Mount Vernon produced whiskey. In 1799, George Washington's distillery produced nearly 11,000 gallons, making it one of the largest whiskey distilleries in America. Mount Vernon has returned to its distilling roots, producing Rye Whiskey. https://whiskey.mountvernon.org/

The Whiskey Rebellion

In 1791, George Washington, listening to his Secretary of the Treasury, Alexander Hamilton, approved an excise tax on liquor to pay the debts created during the Revolutionary War. He certainly wasn't the first to take out his frustrations on whiskey producers when Britain introduced a prohibitive tax on Highland stills. Everyone had it out for the distillers.

Alcohol is produced from food, be it fruit, sugar, or grain, but it is not necessary to sustain life. Therefore, strong drink is a luxury that takes food from the mouths of all people. But the 1791 tax on American whiskey was, of course, very unpopular among the farmer-distillers. Farmer Distillers traded liquor instead of cash, which was still rare. In 1791, you were more likely to use English or Spanish coins than

US coins. The US still needed to get a mint. However, farmer distillers were angrier than Washington and Hamilton counted on. Unrest in Pennsylvania forced Washington to use troops to squash the "Whiskey Rebellion." Many farmers fled Pennsylvania to the territory of Kentucky, giving birth to the Bourbon.

The Whiskey Men of Kentucky

- Bourbons) settled in Old Pepper Springs, Kentucky, in 1776. Within four years, he was selling whiskey.
- Robert Samuels (Maker's Mark Bourbon) arrived in Kentucky in 1780
- Jacob Beam (Jim Beam Bourbon) came to Kentucky in 1785 and, in 1795, sold his first barrel of whiskey.
- Basil Hayden (Old Grand-Dad Bourbon) settled in Kentucky in 1796,
- Henry Hudson Wathen (whose family kept the Old Grand-Dad label alive in the late nineteenth century) began distilling whiskey in Kentucky in 1788.
- The Brown family (Old Forester Bourbon) settled in Kentucky in 1792.
- Daniel Weller (W. L. Weller Bourbon) floated into Bardstown on a flatboat in 1794.

Whether you drink one of the seven whiskeys from the Kentucky founders or local Alaskan small-batch distilleries, whiskey is defined as a spirit distilled from a malted grain: corn, barley, or rye. This product is then aged in wooden barrels (the brown color comes from the tannin in the wood) for any period. Scotch is a whiskey made only from barley. Bourbon is 51% corn and a mixture of rye and malt. Rye is 51% to 100% made from rye grain and can be mixed with other grains. It is aged for two years in American white oak. There are distilleries all over the globe with America, Canada, Japan, and, of course, the Isles. Use the sipping techniques from last month, Thistle. The world of whiskey awaits.
