Denali Stone Challenge



Lifting of the Dinnie Stones in Scotland

Modeled after the Dinnie Stones in Scotland, athletes are being challenged to lift the Denali Stones on Sunday June 30 at the Games. Each athlete will get one attempt to lift the stones. One weighs 470 pounds, the other weighs 360.

Here's how it works: The stones begin on the ground. The Athlete then grips the handles either placing one on the right and one on the left side of the body, or they may place one in front and one behind the body. Athlete will pick the implements up vertically. For a successful lift, The athlete must be standing and showing full locked out in the upper and lower body. The implements need to be entirely lifted from the ground. Once the athlete lifts the stone by the handles and is standing fully locked out, the down command will be given and the athlete will be credited with a successful lift. The athlete only need lift the stones once to complete the challenge.

Will anyone be able to lift them this year? Be there on Sunday June 30 to see for yourself!

Scotch Tasting Details

As we all await the start of the games, we have been teasing you into excitement about our guest distilleries. The 2024 ASHG presents for your enjoyment products from the importer William Grant and Sons: Glenfiddich, Monkey Shoulder, The Balvenie and new this year, the Scottish gin Hendricks. This year's host is Sebastien Derbomez.

New to this year's tasting lineup are Monkey Shoulder and Hendrick's Gin.

According to their website, Monkey Shoulder is a blend of small batch, single malt whisky from Speyside's finest, which brings forth smooth, balanced tasting notes of honey, orange and vanilla. Originally crafted to create the perfect <u>Old Fashioned</u>, its aroma and palate make Monkey Shoulder perfect for mixing. Rich, vibrant, and not overly fruity, this blended whisky can elevate any <u>cocktail</u>.

According to their website, no other gin tastes like Hendrick's gin because no other gin is made like Hendrick's. Infused with the remarkable Bulgarian Rosa Damascena and specially selected cucumbers from the finest producers. Hendrick's gin is distilled in not one but two dissimilar sorts of still. The two leaders of this particular ensemble of stills are the Bennett, an antique copper pot dating right back to 1860, and the Carter-Head, hailing from 1948. The Bennett steeps the botanicals in spirit overnight prior to distillation

resulting in a rich, complex liquid. Whereas the Carter-Head gently steams the botanicals in a basket atop its lofty neck, so influence is imparted upon the spirit in something akin to a botanical steam bath of subtle flavors: orris root, yarrow, chamomile, lemon peel, angelica root, juniper, elderflower, cubeb berries, caraway seed, coriander, and orange peel.

There are four educational sessions scheduled and one high-end tasting. Here are the days and times for each:

Saturday 1:30 and Sunday 4:00 tastings feature Hendrick's Gin, Monkey Shoulder and the Balvenie

Saturday 4:00 and Sunday 1:30 tastings feature Henrick's Gin and Glenfiddich.

Saturday at 5:30 is the High-End Scotch tasting.

Mead: The Ancient Quaff of Heroes

The ASHG is pleased to host **Beard Brothers Meadery** for their 3rd annual Mead tasting. The tastings are Saturday and Sunday at 11:30.

For those of you unfamiliar with Mead, it is the first known alcoholic beverage consumed by mankind and is believed to predate wine by nearly three thousand years. Like wine, mead can be aged for a period of months or years, typically contains 10-14% alcohol, and is **gluten-free**.

From Texas wildflowers to Florida orange blossoms; honey tastes like the flowers of its local region, so for Alaska it's fireweed. How mead tastes depends on the type of honey, how dry or sweet it was crafted to be, and whether or not additional flavors were added. Traditional mead contains only honey, water, and yeast; however, there are many varieties of mead that include fruits, spices, and herbs.

Mead was the primary drink of Celtic and Germanic heroic poetry. One of the earliest mentions of mead is in Beowulf, the Anglo Saxon story based mainly in a great mead hall

I have never seen Mead enjoyed more in any hall on earth.

Vikings were particularly fond of mead and Norse mythology prominently features mead as the sacred drink of warriors and poets.

Today mead is experiencing a resurgence in popularity. People looking for a paleo-friendly or gluten free alcoholic beverage are seeking out mead as a new alternative. An interest in local craft beverages and beverages made with local ingredients is also helping to fuel the growth of mead. Whatever the reason, the Beard Brothers are glad you are interested, and look forward to offering you their new interpretations of this ancient drink.


